

OPERATIONS & Funding

We are open 12-3pm on the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of the month. Surplus and discounted food products are picked up on the proceeding Mondays at the USDA main Northern Idaho distribution center in Coeur d' Alene and Second Harvest in Spokane. The timing of the pick-up immediately prior to distribution days helps to ensure that fresh products are available for our clients. Occasionally some of our food is obtained at grocery stores when our volunteers hear about special sales. And although the food bank has no payroll or rent costs it still incurs considerable expenses. These include utilities, truck and trailer operating expenses, and maintenance and equipment and food bought for distribution. To pay for these costs the food bank relies on monetary donations from individuals and benevolent individual organizations including the Priest Lake Thrift Store, the Priest Lake Lions Club and the Community Assistance League of Sandpoint (CAL).

In addition, fund-raising events are held periodically, and grants are written to pay for some of these expenses. Our grantors have helped with equipment acquisition and repairs as well as building improvements.

In addition, many local residents and organizations go out of their way to donate food to offset our food costs, Seasonal cabin owners who leave Priest Lake in the fall donate their surplus nonperishable food. We can only accept food in its original packaging, not opened and not expired. Any help you can give is greatly appreciated.

From Humble Beginnings...The idea to start a food bank came from the members

The idea to start a food bank came from the members of the Lamb of God Lutheran Church in Priest Lake. Part of their mission statement refers to "meet human needs". Certainly, healthy eating is a basic human need and from this the food bank was born. With limited donations, the first few food bank recipients received less than a bag of groceries. As we were able to source additional resources for food donations, the sacks became fuller and fuller and the number of people receiving them increased.

Local businesses and residents who wanted to help donated basics like used refrigerators and freezers to prevent food spoilage.

In the beginning the food bank was housed at the Lamb of God church rent free. Which was important as it meant that the donations we received could be spent on food and not rent. And while the food bank is not run by the church, the church generously continues to allow us to use the space at no cost.

The food bank is staffed by volunteers who gather food and serve the patrons. The volunteers use their own vehicles to transport food goods to the food bank and deliver food to those who cannot reach our location on an emergency basis.

TODAY'S Mission Statement

To provide high quality food to the Priest Lake area residents whose food budgets may not sustain adequate nutrition.

This is done by sourcing, safely managing and storing and distributing quality food products to those in the Priest Lake area who quality under the guidelines established by the government and not for profit organizations who offer free or discounted food.



THE FOOD BANK Today

The food bank continues to run out of the same location and now shares space with the Priest Lake Thrift Shoppe, but things have changed considerably. We now have four freezers, three refrigerators, our own truck and trailer, and have made improvements to the building, such as adding the covered side porch, for the safety and benefit of those unloading food and for patrons visiting during inclement weather.

All these upgrades were conducted by volunteers who not only acquire and distribute the food but also write grants and conduct fund raising in support of the mission statement. Our volunteers are enthusiastic about what they do. This is exemplified by the fact that many have been volunteering for more than ten years.

The Priest Lake Food Bank has grown in structure. It now has a board of directors, job descriptions for board members, became a 501 (c)(3) not for profit and is working on bylaws and upgrades to its accounting system.

The USDA and Second Harvest (our primary sources for free and discounted food) inspect our food bank operations periodically and all our inspections have been positive.

Most importantly, the food bank continues to serve the Priest Lake community. The number of patrons varies with the seasons. On average 30-40 clients and their families (120-140) visit the food bank twice a month. Many of our clients are retired and living on fixed incomes or unable to work. The food bank is proud of its progress but still faces new challenges and opportunities.
